Membership:


Membership is open to Riders and Pillions of Cruiser and Tourer motorcycles, as well as Social Members.



Harley-Davidson execs meet President Trump

Harley-Davidson executives have ridden motorcycles to the White House to meet with President Trump in what can only be seen as a risky and controversial move for the American company.

Trump was scheduled to visit Milwaukee on Thursday, including a visit to the Harley Museum, but the trip was cancelled.

After social media criticism and planned protests, Harley quickly moved to say no invitation had been issued to the President.



Both Harley and White House sources say the trip was called off because of the planned protests.

There's an old saying: "If the mountain will not come to Muhammad, then Muhammad must go to the mountain." But that's probably an inappropriate analogy in this situation!!

However, Harley executives, including the supreme boss Matt Levatich, did ride to the White House to meet with the President and Vice-President Mike Pence.

It makes for great vision, but is it a politically dangerous move for the company?



Harley-Davidson is suffering from a domestic sales slump and is pinning its hopes on international sales as stated by Matt just a couple of days before.

Bikers for Trump

Trump claims he had a lot of support from bikers during the campaign and a *Bikers for Trump* group was formed and attended most of the rallies.

There seems a lot of biker support domestically for the Don and the Republican Party.

Harley claims "nine out of 10" of their American customers support Trump.

Many rider groups attended Trump rallies and the states with the highest motorcycle ownership – mainly the mid-west – are Republican states. Donald Trump Jr is also a motorcycle rider.

And it has to be remembered that Harley owes a lot to Republican President Ronald Reagan for increasing tariffs against imported motorcycles. Maybe they are hoping for more of that same tariff protection.

The White House meeting appears a rather strange move given Harley has, for the past few years, claimed its sales growth will come from reaching out to Black African Americans, women and Hispanics.

As part of their plan to increase international sales, Harley has also just opened a new dealership in Jakarta, Indonesia, the world's most populated Muslim country.

While there may be big support at home among white Americans for Trump, none of those outreach groups, nor Muslim or other countries, would be expected to be a big Don supporter.

The White House South Lawn meeting looked pleasant enough and no big business was obviously addressed in the three minutes they were there.

Trump said at a later sit-down meeting with Harley execs and union officials: "Harley-Davidson is a true American icon. One of the greats. You've given me tremendous support, your workers in particular."

However, in the past few years, Harley has started building Street 500 and 750 models in India and bought a large parcel of land in Thailand where it is rumoured they will build an assembly plant.

Harley has also handed over its IT department to Indian company Infosys. The Indian tech company has been criticised for employing highly skilled immigrants instead of Americans and is facing class action over discriminatory employment practices.

Does helmet safety match cost? Do you get more protection with a more expensive helmet?

Does helmet safety match how much money you spend on the helmet? It's an often-asked question that we try to verify with statistics.

The Bell helmets ad campaign of 50 years ago "If you've got a \$10 head, wear a \$10 helmet!" may have been true then, but is it now?

We could not find any empirical evidence of the correlation between cost and safety, only anecdotal. For example, I can attest that my Shoei Hornet DS saved my head after I was run over by another bike, but I wouldn't know how a cheaper or more expensive helmet would have coped.

Since you often pay more for special graphics for the same helmet in a solid single colour, we can assume cost isn't always related to safety.



So we have gone to statistics to see if they show any safety/cost correlation.



HELMET SAFETY

It's very difficult to assess all the helmets on the market, so we have used data from two websites: the NSW Transport Accident Commission "Crash" ratings

(http://www.crash.org.au/ratings.php) and the British SHARP helmet safety scheme ratings (https://sharp.dft.gov.uk/).

Both have comprehensive testing systems that provide overall helmet safety ratings out of five for each model.

The Crash site doesn't give prices and only lists 157 helmets, but it shows that full-face helmets are safer (https://motorbikewriter.com/crash-statistics-motorcycle-helmets/), and they are usually more expensive.

Nineteen full-face helmets scored four stars, 56 scored three and 16 two stars, while only 12 open faces scored three stars, 16 scored two and seven scored just one star.

Crash also rates helmet safety on "dual-purpose" models with nine scoring four stars, 13 scored three and one rated two stars.

The more comprehensive SHARP helmet safety scheme is now relevant to our market as these helmets are European UNECE22.05 approved which are allowable across Australia.

So it should cover a range of helmets available here, as well as some that aren't. However, you can still legally buy them over the internet.

Not every helmet is tested and rated, but it gives a good cross-section of open, full-face and modular helmets.



An initial impression of the market is that most are reasonably safe, with 57% scoring four stars or more and 15% scoring one or two stars.

PRICE CATEGORIES

We then divided the helmets into three price categories up to £150 (about \$A240), £150-£450 (about \$A720) and £450 and above. The most expensive was the five-star AGV Pista GP at £799 (\$A1300).

Most helmets were in the cheap category with 209, followed by 150 in the midrange and just 15 in the top sector.



And, as expected, the old Bell advertising slogan is true: The more money you spend, the safer the helmet, at least according to the SHARP ratings.

There were no one-star helmets in the top price category, while 46% top-scored, 20% rated four stars, 26% three stars and just one helmet, the £450 Schuberth S1 Pro, rated two stars.

So you can still pay a lot of money and not get great safety.

But while the statistics show the more you spend the more safety you get, there are some anomalies.

Thankfully, there are 17 helmets under £150 that top score (seven of which are Caberg), plus a whopping 42% with four stars and 29% with three stars.

In the midrange, there are 32% that top-scored, 46% with four stars, 26.5% with three stars and 7.2% with two or one star.

BEST AND WORST BRANDS

It is more difficult to assess which are the best and worst brands, as it depends on how many models they have.

For example, BMW helmets are not necessarily bad because they only have one helmet with five stars. There are only three helmets featured.

The most prolific helmet brand in the survey is Shark with 24 helmets and all but one scored four or more stars, making it the safest, statistically.



It marginally pips AGV with 20 out of 21 helmets rating four and above, then Caberg with nine out of 10, Bell with nine out of 12 and Shoei with eight out of 11.

CHOOSING YOUR HELMET

However, you can't use statistics to buy your helmet.

Every helmet needs to be evaluated by the rider for a solid mix of price, purpose and safety.

So we encourage riders to check the above websites to check for safety star ratings.

Then it's a matter of getting an affordable helmet that fits your head. Remember, every rider's head is a different shape and helmets also have different shapes that present varied pressure points.



They do things differently in Russia! This is the amazing Russian Taurus 2x2. Probably not a "touring" bike (and thus ineligible for Steel Horses); but then again I guess that depends on where you're planning on going touring!! :-)

With 12-inch wide, 25-inch diameter fat wheels and a simple two-wheel drive system, this unique and "distinctive" Russian agricultural bike can crawl its way through all kinds of mud and slush. The Taurus 2x2 is a lightweight, simple, two-wheel drive motorbike that pulls apart in minutes to fit in the trunk of a car — as long as you have enough room for those tires.



Taurus 2x2: uniquely Russian approach to off-road motorcycling

Taurus 2x2: disassembles quickly to fit in the back of the car

Taurus 2x2: decent off-road capability

Taurus 2x2: two wheel drive system makes it very capable in boggy mud



It's not glamorous. It's ... really not glamorous. But as a kind of weird ag motorcycle, this just might have a few things going for it. Engine-wise, the company seems happy to put whatever you want in there, from the recommended Honda GX210 to an ultra-lightweight chainsaw motor, depending on what mix of performance vs weight you want to go for.

And that's a relevant thing to think about with this one, because even with that

210cc engine in it, it weighs in at just 82 kg (181 lb). With a smaller motor you can get it under 60 kg (132 lb), making it reasonably easy to haul the bike up and over any obstacles you can't ride over with those giant 25x12-inch fat tires.

Tire pressures need to be kept low, not much higher than 3 psi, since the bike's designed for extremely rough and muddy terrain and there's no suspension at either end.

The rigid front end geometry makes it easy to implement two-wheel drive, with a second chain drive running down to the front wheel, but the Taurus website gives no details on how that system chooses to proportion power to the front and rear wheels. The gearbox appears to be a two-speed, which should be adequate given the top speed of just 35 km/h (22 mph).

Utility racks on the front and rear are handy for carrying things about, including other Taurus bikes at a pinch. And since the




bike is so light and the tires have so much air in them, you can wash it off by floating it in a river and giving it a bit of throttle.

When it's time to head home, the bike comes apart in about five minutes into a series of bits that fit easily in the back of a four wheel drive or station wagon. The wheels pop out, the front end hinges off with the



release of a single bolt, and you're ready to throw it in the car. Mind you, it's gonna be absolutely filthy by that point, because it's a mud demon.

The cost, as far as we can tell, is around 75,000 Russian roubles, or a little over US\$1,100 per bike, and it seems the Taurus is already in production with at least several dozen already made. The company isn't shipping internationally yet but says it's on the cards.



A note about Ride Rules that appeared on page 9 of the November 2009 Steel Horses newsletter:

By-Laws-Ride Rules

"SAFETY OVERIDES ALL RULES"

- 1. All members should contact the Ride Captain the day before a ride to advise they would be attending.
- All riders must meet at the appointed meeting area at least 10 minutes before the specified departure time with a full tank of fuel.
- 3. The Ride Captain is the only person who will alter the destination on a given ride day.
- 4. All members must comply with the Ride Captain's instructions concerning safety or behaviour.
- 5. Position yourself in the front, middle or back of a ride where you feel the most comfortable.
 - Try not to keep changing positions.
 - Ride in a staggered formation.
 - Try to keep the group together, as long as you are not exceeding your level of skill and comfort.
 - However, always put your personal safety above any other consideration such as ride formation or meeting point times.
- 6. Always keep the rider behind you in view whenever possible.
 - If you lose sight of following riders, pull over in a safe but visible position.
- 7. The designated "Tail End Charlie" must always remain at the back of the ride.
- The Ride Captain must not leave the ride without nominating a backup ride leader, and ensuring that everyone is aware of the substitution.
- 9. Never pass the Ride Captain unless you have their specific permission to do so.
- Riders may leave the ride on a nominated "breakout" that the Ride Captain will indicate by waving their left arm over their head.
 - If you pass the ride captain on a breakout you have formally left the club ride, and may rejoin the group later
- When overtaking a vehicle, riders must ensure that they do so safely, and allow sufficient room for following riders.
- 12. If you have any issues with the conduct of the ride, make sure you discuss these with the Ride Captain at the first opportunity, and if possible before the ride commences.
- 13. Always wear your vest to Club rides.
- 14. Always remember you are on this ride for the primary purpose of having fun and a good time, so enjoy the ride and join in all the activities on the day.

How to handle a decreasing radius corner

It's one of those heart-in-the-mouth moments when the corner suddenly tightens up and you're running out of cornering clearance and room to complete the turn.

We've all had that moment which can lead to running off the road, into oncoming traffic or low-siding the bike.

How you deal with the corner really comes in three parts: avoiding being caught by surprise, positioning your bike correctly and dealing with a tightening radius.

AVOID BEING CAUGHT

Don't ever get in the situation where a bend surprises you.

If you've ridden the road before, you should file a mental note of which turns tighten up so you are better prepared next time.

A mental note could consist of a sign on approach, an unusual tree or some other landmark.

However, if it's a new section of road you've never ridden before, survey the line markings or the road edges for clues of the radius.

If the outside line or edge of the road is getting closer to the centre line or inside edge of the bend, then it is tightening.

Don't commit your lean angle and speed to this corner until you see the road edges moving further apart again, which is the clue it is opening up again.

Some corners can be blind and you may need to look for other clues such as the brake lights of the vehicle in front, overhead lines that suddenly turn or a diminishing tree, hedge or fence line.




Survey all corners

POSITION YOUR BIKE

If you've determined the radius is tightening, position your bike as wide as possible while washing off speed with brakes and downshifts.

A wide approach to the corner will make your apex further around the bend and alert you earlier to a tightening radius.

Keep looking at the end of the corner, that point where the "lines" are close together. Don't look at the other side of the road or the bushes where you think you might end up ... or you will!



Green is good, red bad!

HANDLING THE CORNER

Even so, you might still get caught out by long bends that tighten unexpectedly toward the end, so you may need to make some mid-corner corrections.

If you've been holding some throttle, don't shut it down. Hold it neutral or slightly decrease throttle.

Don't try downshifting, either, unless you are really smooth at matching engine and ground speeds or the rear wheel may lock up and flick you over the high side.

Instead, push a little more on the inside handlebar which is a counter-steering input that will lean your bike further. You'll be surprised how far you can lean the bike without sliding or falling off.

You can also add a little more rear brake which will pull the bike into a steeper lean as well as slow it down.

Don't touch the front brakes as well unless you are really smooth as it may cause a low slide or stand the bike up again which will run you wide.

OVER-COMMITTED

If you've overcommitted and have run out of ground clearance, you may be in a fair bit of trouble.


The only thing to do is to smoothly squeeze more front and brake to slow you down as much as possible while keeping your lean angle stable.

Keep looking at the corner exit and you just may wash off enough speed to make it around the corner. And then you can set up for the next one!
